# Purpose and legal basis for processing your child's personal information

As part of this evaluation project it may be necessary to process your child's personal information.

The legal basis we rely on to process your child's personal information is Article 6(1)(e) of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) where the processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in Ofsted. This includes processing of personal data that is necessary for the exercise of a function conferred on Ofsted by an enactment and as a government department.

Under the Education and Inspections Act 2006, Ofsted is required to carry out its work in ways that encourage the services it inspects and regulates to improve, to be user-focused and to be efficient and effective in their use of resources.

In order to do this the Chief Inspector may do anything that she considers necessary or expedient for the purposes of, or in connection with, her functions including carrying out evaluation.

- Details from workbooks we will not record names but may take photographs of workbook pages and record observations of the workbooks

#### How do we get information?

Most of the personal information we process will be provided to us directly by your child.

We may also receive personal information indirectly, in the following scenarios:

- We have contacted the school your child attends about the evaluation project and it gives us your child's personal information in its response.
- Your child's personal information is contained in reports given to us by your school.

## What we do with your child's information

We will only use the information for the purposes of the evaluation project to compile and prepare a report and we will not publish any identifying information.

We will not share your child's information with any third parties for the purposes of the evaluation. No third parties will have access to your child's personal information unless the law allows.

### How long we keep your child's personal information and how we decide this

We will keep information that is relevant to the evaluation project for as long as this evaluation project is active.

We may keep this information for a longer period of time, depending on whether any issues arise from the evaluation project.

We will minimise or anonymise data where possible and will not include any names. We will anonymise any personal information taken from workbooks and will not record pupils' names from those workbooks.

## What are your rights

You have the right to choose for your child not to take part in this evaluation project.

We are acting in the exercise of our official authority so you have the right to object to our processing of your child's personal information at any time.
