Covid-19 update: Stage 3 continues

As you may be aware, we are staying at Stage 3 of lockdown restrictions. This means that we need to continue with social distancing measures, including wearing a face covering in shops, on public transport or in places where it is difficult to keep 2 metres away from other people (unless you are exempt). Your school may have asked you to wear face coverings in corridors and classrooms: please check with your teachers if you are unsure of what to do.

You can also help by taking your rapid test (which is sometimes called an LFD test) twice a week. Remember to report your result, even if it is negative.

T-levels

Lots of people have heard about A-levels, NVQs and BTECs, but have you heard about T-levels?

T-levels are a new type of course, first introduced in 2020, and they are equivalent to three A-levels. They offer industry placements and are split between classroom and practical learning.

They focus on areas such as:

- Accounting and finance
- Agriculture and animal care
- Building and construction
- Catering
- Design
- Digital development
- Education and childcare
- Hair, beauty and aesthetics
- Health and healthcare
- Law, management and administration (including human resources)
- Engineering and manufacturing
- Media, broadcast and production
- Science

T-levels are only offered at specific colleges, and not all colleges offer all T-levels. This allows colleges to specialise in certain areas of study and share their expertise.

Platinum Jubilee Design Competition

Next year, Queen Elizabeth II will celebrate her platinum jubilee. This means she has been the monarch for 70 years, something no other king or queen has achieved.

To help the celebrations, The Royal Household and the V & A museum in London are inviting young people between the ages of 13 and 25 to design an emblem to mark the jubilee celebrations. The emblem (like a logo) will feature on publicity, official websites and social media.

To enter, you need to design an emblem that is:

- Creative: your design must be striking and original.
- Usable: the design must be simple enough to work on small and large scales, in black and white and in colour.
- Relevant: it needs to be easy to recognise and relevant to The Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

You will also need to follow these criteria and make sure that your emblem:

- Includes a drawing of a royal crown.
- Is drawn freehand and/or using computer design software.
- Can be reproduced as a 2-dimensional flat image and also is legible on smaller screens.
- Is able to be submitted online in JPEG, PNG, TIFF or PDF file format.
- Does not contain any drawing of The Queen herself or any likeness.
- Does not include anything else apart from the design.
- Does not include any names or personal details.
- Does not include anything that you have copied from somewhere else (except drawings of the royal crown which are permitted).

Remember to check with an adult before entering the competition as you will need to supply their email address as your point of contact. You will also need to read the terms and conditions with an adult to check you and they are happy with the rules of the competition and what will happen to your design if you are shortlisted for the final or win the competition.
