Science Week

Last week was British Science Week, a ten-day event about celebrating scientific discoveries. Some of the focus points for this year were 'Time', which encouraged us to think about the impact of passing time on scientific fields of study, and 'Smashing Stereotypes', which highlighted the diversity of people and careers in science, technology, engineering, and maths.

In honour of British Science Week, Ms Lissaman and Year 8 group 8E designed and put posters up around the school to encourage students to recycle their plastic bottles. Ms Lissaman came up with the idea after seeing how people neglected the three recycling bins downstairs in the canteen. She recruited 8E to help her to raise the profile of recycling and sustainability in Stopsley High School.

At the end of the school day, 8E students would use form time to meet Ms Lissaman and collect plastic bottles from the bins to put in waste bags. At the end of the week, 8E took the bags and the posters and put them into Ms Lissaman's car so she could take them to be recycled.

St Patrick's Day

On the 17th of March every year, St Patrick's Day is by far the biggest holiday in Ireland and very popular in the rest of the British Isles, and in the USA, too. But who was St. Patrick, anyway? And why did this day become so popular in the first place? This article aims to answer that for you.

St Patrick was born around 386 AD in Britain. Considering Northern Ireland was not part of Britain back then, that meant he wasn't even Irish! At sixteen, he was kidnapped by Irish pirates and enslaved for the next six years. During this time all alone, he turned to God. One night, he dreamt of a ship setting sail at the coast. When he woke up, he ran as fast as he could to the coast, where a ship was about to leave. His faith had grown when he was captured, so he eventually became a bishop. One day he had another dream, with many voices telling him to return to Ireland. He took this as a sign from God and went there to convert people to Christianity. This wasn't an easy job, as Ireland was largely pagan, and so he was unsafe wherever he went. Nonetheless, he converted many people over his lifetime and gained popularity.

St Patrick would also go on to have many legends about him, some more believable than others. One of these was that he drove all the snakes away from Ireland, representing him cleansing the country of Paganism. The problem is that Ireland couldn't have had any in the first place, nor could any have migrated there due to the coldness of the waters surrounding it!

Another was that he taught people about the Holy Trinity—that is, The Father, The Son and the Holy Spirit—by using the three leaves on shamrocks. A shamrock isn't a real plant but a broad description of three-leafed plants, often referring to the clover. This birthed the tradition of wearing them on St Patrick's Day, which evolved into people wearing full green attire.

Something unusual you might not expect is that St Patrick's Day parades started in the USA. This was because of the great Potato Famine, which caused a massive influx of Irish people to flood into New York, Boston, and other major US cities. These parades have become the biggest St Patrick's Day parades in the world.

In conclusion, St Patrick's Day isn't just a celebration of the patron saint himself, although it is celebrated on the traditionally accepted date of his death. It has evolved into a celebration of Irish culture overall, with many festivities and ways of celebrating that were born long after the day's formation. - Katey O, Year 9
